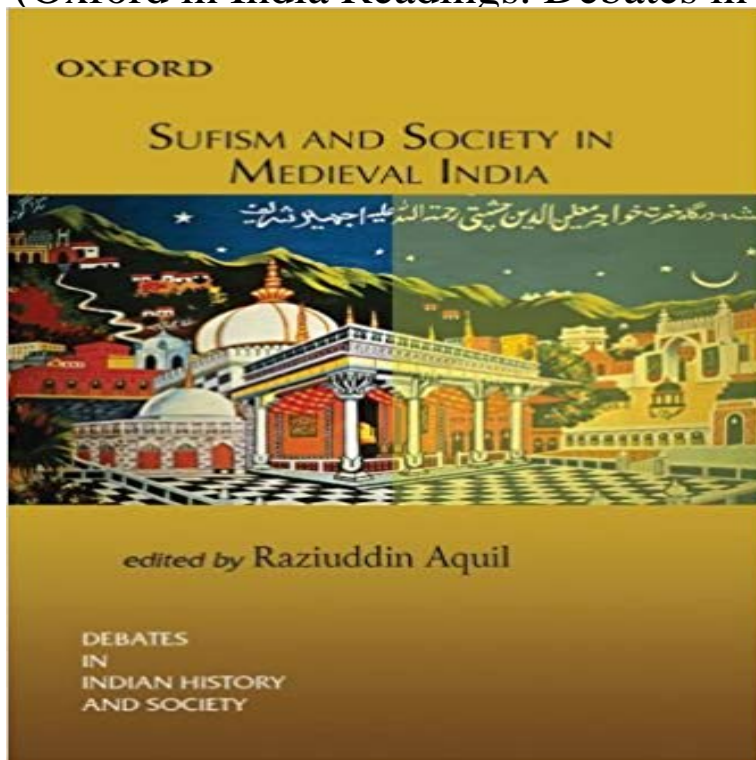


Sufism and Society in Medieval India (Debates in Indian History) (Oxford in India Readings. Debates in Indian History and Soci)
